

Got your results & need to know what financial support is out there?

Cash, money, funds ... what financial support is there for me?

So you've got your GCSE results and thinking about going to sixth form or college. Although post 16 education is free there might be some help available to cover the costs of staying in learning.

16 - 19 Bursary Fund

Young people who need some extra money to help them stay in education or training after 16 can apply to their school, college or training provider for the new 16-19 Bursary Fund.

If you are in care, a care leaver, receiving income support (or Universal Credit) or are a disabled young person receiving both Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance (or Personal Independence Payments) then you are eligible for a £1,200 bursary.

Other students facing money difficulties may also be able to claim support from the 16-19 Bursary Fund for help with transport, food, equipment or other course-related costs.

Child Benefit

If you go to sixth form or college the child benefit that your parent or carer receives will continue. The course or training needs to be full time (more than 12 hours a week in term time) and can include GCSEs, A levels, NVQs and BTECs. Earning money with work-based learning

If you are working – you have a right to a national minimum wage.

The current rates from April 2024:

- £11.44 per hour for workers aged 21 years +
- £8.60 per hour for workers aged 18 20.
- £6.40 for workers under 16 17.
- £6.40 per hour for apprentices.
